### **ENCOURAGING ACTIVE CITIZENTRY TO COMBAT RISING HIGH-RISE LITTER**

PHC and Grassroots Leaders reached out to residents.

- 1. Singapore, 17 January 2023 The recent introduction of the high-rise littering presumption clause and the increase in high-rise litter complaints over the last four years prompted the Public Hygiene Council (PHC) and Grassroots Leaders in three constituencies to engage residents to deter and discourage this inconsiderate habit which concerns public safety.
- 2. In a recent Parliamentary session, the Minister for Sustainability and the Environment, Ms Grace Fu, said that the National Environment Agency (NEA) had seen a spike in high-rise littering complaints from about 16,000 per year prior to 2019, to 22,000, 35,000 and 32,000 complaints in 2019, 2020 and 2021, respectively. This upward trend in 2020 and 2021 could be due to the COVID-19 measures where the public were confined to their homes. About 15% of the offenders between 2019 and 2021 were not identified.
- 3. The PHC, together with the Advisers and the Grassroots Organisations (GROs) of the Tampines North, Mountbatten and Kolam Ayer, visited the residential heartlands to greet the residents on the 11, 13 and 17 January, ahead of the Lunar New Year. During the engagements with residents, the impact of high-rise litter on public safety and on the environment was raised. Discussions centred on what could be done to proactively deter and prevent high-rise littering from happening. Generally, many residents welcome the introduction of the presumption clause to tackle the issue of high-rise littering.
- **4.** Specially designed PHC red packets that feature the Supermons Trayremon, Trashemon, and Toilemon, each representing the PHC's three focus areas of tray return, proper binning of trash and good toilet etiquette, were also given to the

residents. The set of eight red packets each contained messages on the three abovementioned focus areas and high-rise littering, and well wishes for the Lunar New Year.

- 5. Mr Baey Yam Keng, Senior Parliamentary Secretary, Ministry of Sustainability and the Environment, and Ministry of Transport, and Adviser to Tampines GROs, visited Tampines North on 11 January 2023. He stated: "While the Government takes a harder stance against high-rise littering offenders, we still believe that prevention is the best cure. I am glad that many residents also share this point of view and were receptive to the introduction of the high-rise littering presumption clause."
- **6.** Said Adviser to Mountbatten GROs, Mr Lim Biow Chuan, who visited his residents on 13 January 2023: "High-rise littering not only poses a danger to residents, it also dirties our neighbourhood. We need to stem out high-rise littering and this can only be possible if all of us play our part!"
- 7. "High-rise littering can have serious consequences. Through the outreach with the PHC, I hope that we can work together effectively as a community to nip this problem in the bud," said Dr Wan Rizal, Adviser to Jalan Besar GRC GROs, who visited his residents on 17 January 2023.
- 8. Mr Said Bin Abdul Wahid, a resident in Mountbatten commented: "High-rise littering can cause inconvenience and in some cases, pose danger to others. I believe that having a presumption clause can be a good deterrent. The communities should remind each other and work together to make Singapore a safer and cleaner place for everyone."
- 9. Mr Edward D'Silva, Chairman of the PHC, said: "The PHC takes the increase in high-rise littering complaints very seriously. We are supportive of the new Bill that presumes that a flat owner of a unit proven to be the source of a high-rise littering act to be guilty of the act unless he or she can prove otherwise. High-rise litter can cause injuries or death. We hope that as a society, we can become more civic-minded. The onus is on us not to litter and to prevent others from littering."

### **About Public Hygiene Council:**


